COURSE ABSTRACT

This course introduces students to the fundamentals of intellectual property law. Through the detailed study of recent cases and current events, we will explore the legal framework of intellectual property law; trademarks, design rights, patents and copyright; trade secrets, and practical aspects of IP protection and enforcement.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

Academic and professional competences to be gained through the course

Knowledge

This course will focus on introducing students to the substantive law of intellectual property in Europe, including an understanding of the international, European and national legal framework for patents, trademarks, design rights, trade secrets, and copyright. The course is designed to convey an understanding of the nature of intellectual property rights, how such rights are secured and how they are enforced against third parties.

- Competencies

Students will gain experience in analysing the hierarchy of legal norms as it applies to intellectual property rights and identifying the correct source of law to analyse, understand and solve problems in the field of IP. The course reading will provide training in effectively reading and understanding European and national case law.

- Skills

Students will gain skills in reading and understanding international conventions (including the Berne and Paris conventions, TRIPS), European Union treaty law, relevant directives and regulations; identifying national legal norms relevant to solving specific IP problems; they will develop skills in analysing legal arguments and articulating their own; they will practice legal writing skills with a particular focus on clarity, structure and addressing specified issues and questions.
