### **COURSE ABSTRACT**

The course provides a study of the existing law of state responsibility.

The first part of the course is devoted to the analysis of the Articles on Responsibility of States for Internationally Wrongful Acts (ARSIWA) adopted by the International Law Commission in 2001. Each session is devoted to a separate aspect of the ARSIWA: attribution, the concept of breach, circumstances precluding wrongfulness, legal consequences of an internationally wrongful act, and so on. During the seminars, the students will apply the provisions of the ARSIWA to real-life and fictional cases.

The second part of the course focuses on the responsibility of international organisations and recent developments in this field of law.
